Part 4 God's Love and Salvation

But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God... (John 1.12)


It says that we are made children of God through our faith in Christ. We will receive a new body and eternal life and go to heaven. This is the love of God and His wonderful promise.


FIT
