Seedlings Half Harvested

While growing the seedlings takes just a short period of time, it's actually the most important part of the process. If you grow your seedlings mindfully, taking care to give them the right amount of water and light, and maintaining the ideal temperature, you will produce a quality crop.

The same can be said for raising children. Children are with their parents for only a small part of their lives, but how we interact with them, how diligently we put our heart and soul into parenting, and how much quality time we spend with them will greatly impact their lives.

A Child's Happiness

Every parent wants their child to be happy. To achieve this, it is important to think about your child's future and to raise your child diligently and accordingly. Mission of MeySen Academy








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Our new building, the Toddler House, has been completed at the Maruyama Campus.

Our before and after-school childcare program, which had been using the Autumn Building until now, moved to the Toddler House in April. We are also starting a new program at MeySen in September, which we will call the Toddler Class. This new program for two-year-olds, will also be using the spacious



The architect who designed the Toddler House

The Toddler House was designed by Mike Whalen, a regisered architect with the American Institute of Architects in Seattle. Mike has designed all the current kindergarten buildings at both the Maruyama and Takamori campus, and he purposefully de-

signed the new Toddler House to blend in with the existing buildings and campus landscape and to provide a warm and welcoming atmosphere for our students.

Mike is a well-known architect who has designed several office buildings, but MeySen Academy is the only school he has designed. Since the first building he designed for MeySen was completed back in 1999, the concept of "children coming from their own homes to MeySen's 'big house' every day" has not changed.

Toddler Class Opens in September

In September of this year, MeySen Kindergarten will become a four-year preschool, with the addition of our newest program, the Toddler Class. This new program is for two-yearolds, and they will be joining the kindergarten starting in September for the 2023 school year, and then from April from 2024 onward. The decision to start this new program was made in order to meet the needs of working parents, and to provide the same education that has been cultivated at MeySen so far, for these younger students. Many people showed interest, and the number of families that applied was over two-and-a-half times higher than the number of openings available.

We are thrilled to welcome our newest little students, at both MeySen kindergarten campuses this September!
